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## **Sharon**

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Sharon — When the 16-foot, paper-mache statue of Sharon

**RELATED STORIES** Academy headmaster Michael Livingston fell on Caleb Hale during the wee hours of a fall morning, the TSA senior wasn't sure if he should laugh or cry.

The ambitious project, scheduled to be unveiled the following

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day on campus, toppled around 12:30 a.m., temporarily sending Hale face down into the school driveway.

Other students working on the project helped dust o their classmate and the enormous rendering of Livingston before the group tethered the statue to a picnic table for structural support and headed home, exhausted.

Hale concluded his anecdote — part of a graduation speech on Sunday — by recalling that somehow, it all came together in the end. He noted that when he felt the statue project weighing on him, literally or

guratively, accepting the help and support of others was guite helpful.

Hale, Sharon's recipient of the UVM Green and Gold full-scholarship, o ered statewide to the senior with the highest grade point average, said there was no instruction manual for the task of depicting the headmaster in such a grand scale.

Over the course of construction, however, the team began to accept their statue's inevitable imperfections.

"Big, long processes aren't going to have perfect endings all the time," Hale said following the ceremony, which was held inside in the air-conditioned Sharon Academy gymnasium. "It wasn't a perfect-looking statue, but I was still pretty proud that it was there at the top of the driveway, that it was as big as it was (and) that we got it to stand back up."

Four additional seniors where part of the VAST program at Vermont Technical College, which allows students to simultaneously complete their nal year of high school and initial year of college.

Each of the 27 recognized on Sunday, gave their own speech, prefaced by personalized introductions from Livingston, who spoke on behalf of the faculty. Graduates then stepped over to John Roe, president of the Board of Trustees, to receive their diplomas, then to their respective advisors for the transferring of the tassel from one side of the cap to the other.

Gabriella Atkinson approached the podium with a ukulele and played it while performing her

original song, Time to Go.

Atkinson, who lived in her mother's home country of New Zealand from ages 7 to 14 and once appeared on the television show, *New Zealand's Got Talent*, is bound for the Berklee College of Music.

The budding songwriter considers voice her primary instrument, but is also pro cient in guitars.

"It took me, in the grand scheme of things, when I rst came up with the chorus, quite a few months to pick it up again and try and write more," Atkinson said. "But once I started getting the ball rolling, (it took) a day or two."

Alexandra Kendall didn't bring a prop onstage, leaving many potential visual aides at home.

Kendall, who's o to St. Michael's College in the fall, owns some 45 reptiles and 12 tarantulas. The reptiles are primarily snakes — save 10 lizards — and they share a special room in her house with the arachnids. The Stra ord resident has grown accustomed to providing educational demos to local schools, including her own. Kendall often brings ve or six of her specimens along and allows students to interact with them following her presentation.

"My primary goal is to dispel myths about reptiles," said Kendall, who plans to return home regularly from college to tend to her animals. "They get a bad reputation."
